

HOTEL MAP







CINEMA OBSCURA

Cinema Obscura's film schedule is now integrated into the main Programming Schedule and aligned with panel listings chronologically in the Program Book and Pocket Program.

WHY & HOW?

Most conventions' film schedules are separate from a con's Programming schedule and accommodate the length of one film followed by a short break, then the next film's length, another break, and so on, not considering how members don't like to miss part of a panel or part of a film in the process when a film overlaps more than one Programming time slot.

With panels scheduled 11:30 - 12:30, 1:00 - 2:00, 2:30 - 3:30, etc., if a particular 2-hour film starts at noon, it overlaps 2-panel time slots.

So, you'll either miss part of a panel or part of a movie. Frustrating!

To fix this, 2023s selections were first chosen for their brevity: Short enough to start and end during the 30-minute breaks on either side of a particular 1-hour panel slot, to allow folks at least a few minutes to get to the film room from their previous destination before showtime, with time to spare after "The End" before the next time slot's scheduled events!

The next, but most important criteria was to select what you, the audience, might wish to view.

Obscure, yet familiar enough for your viewing pleasure.

After careful consideration, what emerged is what I refer to as "Crowd pleasers that never quite found a big enough crowd to please."

- A Russian superhero movie that tries to be Marvel's The Avengers
- An animated Batman tale with the voice talents of Adam West, Burt Ward, and William Shatner
- A dark comedy about a homicidal tire (Yep, you read that right!)
- Wes Anderson's animation about a boy and his dog (not the Harlan Ellison story)
- A documentary about the greatest SF film NEVER made, another about one of the greatest SF films EVER made, along with a cult classic with solid ties to all of them
- Some of the earliest Marvel cartoons from 1966
- A 50-year-old animated series with characters known to everyone
- A near-future conspiracy tale with an indescribable animation technique
- An unlikely time travel film from 2010 with two stars from Loki Season 1 (unrelated to that 2021 series)

I hope you find these selections to be as intriguing and as entertaining as I, and our new integrated programming schedule convenient.

WHAT IS MN-STF?

It's the Minnesota Science Fiction Society, variously abbreviated MnStf, Minn-STF, MN-STF, and other variants. It's the non-profit group that brings you Minicon.

The Minnesota Science Fiction Society, Inc. is a non-profit organization dedicated to furthering the appreciation of science fiction and fantasy literature. Minn-Stf was founded in 1966 and we've been active in the worldwide community of science fiction fandom ever since. We also do other charitable/educational work.

BECOME A MEMBER!

How do you become a member of MnStF? It's easy! If you ever attend a meeting, you're a member. If you sign in at five meetings in a year, you become a voting member for that year and can help choose the Minn-Stf board.

MEETINGS!

Minn-StF usually meets on the first and third Saturdays of each month. Meetings are casual social gatherings – house parties, picnics and remotely on Discord for the last year

It's possible that you find the idea of showing up at a new person's home uninvited a little intimidating, but guess what? ... You're invited!

People wander in and out whenever they see fit. Most meetings contain a brief (five- or ten-minute) business meeting which consist primarily of announcements of upcoming events.

MINICON 55 FINANCES

Minicon 55 was directed by the MN-Stf board to bring in \$2900 more than it spent, to cover the club's anticipated expenses of \$3900 (which includes storing Minicon's stuff), while spending down \$1000 of excess savings. We hit this almost exactly at \$3079. Memberships were 92% of our income, with donations, t-shirts, dealer tables and misc each making up 2%. The most common membership rate paid was \$45. 

POLICIES

Minicon occurs in a hotel, which is part of a city, county, state, and country. All rules and laws imposed by these larger entities apply, even though being at a con may make you feel out of this world.

HELP AND INFORMATION

Ask at the Registration/Volunteers/Info desk while they're open, or after hours at the Consuite or Bar, or other department heads.

WEAPONS

Prop weapons or costume pieces must be secured and pose no danger to others. We reserve the right to prohibit any such items from our function rooms.

SMOKING

Minnesota is smoke free in all public places, but there are designated smoking areas outside. Direct further questions to the hotel.

COVID POLICY

VACCINATIONS

Minicon 56 requires attending members to have received a bivalent covid booster (also known as an "updated booster"), if eligible. If you got a booster since September 1, 2022, it was bivalent. Most people over age 5 are eligible for a bivalent booster. See the CDC's info page for details.

We reserve the right to check your vaccination status at the time of badge pick-up. Acceptable forms of proof include an original vaccination card, a photo of it, or a phone app.

AIR FILTERS

We will be running high-quality HEPA filters in the consuite, con bar, and in the main gaming room.

MASKS

Where required, masks must cover both the nose and mouth and be at least as good as a multi-layer cloth mask. We strongly encourage more effective masks such as surgical masks and N-95s.

We will have free N-95s at the registration desk for anyone who wants one. N-95s, worn properly, are highly effective at protecting both the wearer from others and others from the wearer.

Masks are optional except as follows:

- In panel programming rooms masks are required for both panelists and the audience.
- In concerts, masks are required for the audience, but not for performers on stage.
- In the official music circle, masks are required except for the person currently performing or leading a song.

This list is subject to change.

Signs around the con will mark whether masks are required or optional.

CODE OF CONDUCT

Minn-stf acknowledges that interpersonal relationships are complex and not everyone likes everyone else, and not everyone agrees with everyone else.

Disagreements, friction, and vigorous debate are expected. However, interactions that become hostile or coercive do not have any part in a healthy social environment and Mnstf commits to addressing problem behaviors.

Harassment is difficult to define, and attempts at an exact definition are subject to ruleslawyering, so we won't attempt to do that.

However, repeated unwelcome behaviors are mostly likely to be construed as harassment. If someone asks you not to touch them, not to talk to them, or not to refer to them in a way that they find objectionable, and you persist in doing so, you may be harassing them.

Actions that are sufficiently egregious (assault, truly hateful language, and comparable actions) fall under this policy, even if only one occurrence has been noted.

In the end, harassment is judged primarily by the person who feels harassed, and actions are more important than intent.

If someone tells you to stop something they perceive as harassing behavior, stop right away. If you tell someone to stop something you see as harassing behavior and they don't, you may tell us. If you don't feel comfortable telling someone to stop harassing behavior, you may also tell us. We want to make sure everyone is heard so that together we can make Minicon a healthy, fun, enjoyable experience for everyone.

To report violations of this code, whether or not action is desired, go to the registration desk and talk to the staff there.
