Mpls in 2073 Progress Report 12: July 2024

Party Report, again!

We went to back-to-back cons in July 2023, first Diversicon and then Pemmi-con, that year's NASFiC.

The party was a success, both partywise and financially! We had planned to run a party on the regular party floor Friday and Saturday, but various restrictions imposed by the hotel led to a completely accidental course of events in which we ended up, instead, throwing the party in the consuite Friday, Saturday, and Sunday nights. This turned out to be the perfect space for us; we couldn't have planned it better on purpose. It was a medium-large suite with a main room of perhaps 500 square feet, a side room for sleeping (primarily used by the head of consuite for that purpose, but also used by us for storage), and a outside patio shared with four other rooms, with pool access. We put the bid table in the back of the room along with the blog bowl, and had activities in the front half, including coloring Minneapolis in '73 Zeppelins to hang on the wall, making paper airplanes for a video to be included in an Ig Noble Award ceremony, and playing games. Jettisoned ideas included having party goers carve miniature butter sculptures, like at the Minnesota State Fair.

At Pemmi-con, we got 38 new members and 12 upgrades (see below). Cathy Coulson is our 73rd blogger! We got nearly as many new members as we got at last year's Worldcon, where we had a two-night party. The NASFiC crowd is eager to support us! We do plan to repeat this party at the Buffalo NASFiC next year. Hope to see you there.

It was our negative 50th anniversary! And of course also the positive 50th anniversary of the 1973 Worldcon, the target of MN-Stf's original, originally serious, Worldcon bid. Yes, that bid was serious from at least June 1968, when it is mentioned in Rune #7 that they were placing an ad in that year's Worldcon (Baycon) program book, to December 1970, when Rune #19 announced that the club was withdrawing themselves from consideration, saying "The reasons are various; primarily, though, the general decline in the economy has forced us to



tighten our collective belts and weather the recession without a worldcon bid. We hope to bid again in a few more years." Well, it took us until 2009 to launch a new bid — for a con in the *future*, anyway — but we did! As far as bidding for a con in the past, we started that up at the Worldcon in 1973, Torcon II, where Minnstf threw a Minneapolis in '73 party, despite it being 1973 already. This was apparently the second Minneapolis in '73 party held at a Worldcon. As reported in Rune 33 (November 1973), "since Minneapolis had a successful 'Minneapolis in '73' party at St.Louis in 1969, I [Chuck Holst] decided to give it a try at Torcon. I announced my intentions at a club meeting, Caryl Bucklin suggested spending \$50 of treasury money on it, and the club concurred, making it an official 'Minneapolis in '73' party. It ran for three nights and could have run for two more if we had had the money and the will, but Bev [Swanson] and I closed it up the last two nights and went to other people's parties, instead. I am happy to report that it was one of the most popular parties at the con." Buttons were the popular thing back then, not ribbons, and they indeed had Minneapolis in '73 buttons.

Jim Young started Minicon, first run in January 1968, with the express

goal of building Minn-stf up to be a club that could run a Worldcon; he

had just been to NyCon 3, the 1967 Worldcon, and was pumped to run

We advertised our party as the "50th an-

niversary, we're not saying which way". While this was the positive 50th

We also threw a party both nights at Windycon. We introduced our new Smoooooooth member level, which costs \$73 eeeeeeeeeven (no fudging). When someone joins or upgrades at the Smoooooooooooooth level, we do a smooth, in the style of Bob Tucker. [Some here will be baffled, and I don't know how to unbaffle them.] Unfortunately, it is impossible to do a smooth in the proper old way, because Beam's Choice is now a "legacy spirit." In other words, they don't make it anymore. We decided that Jim Beam Double Oak was a reasonable equivalent.

Interestingly, we had as many people upgrading their membership as getting new memberships.

At regional cons, people aren't as familiar with Worldcon as at Worldcons and NASFiCs. Now that we're getting so close to the voting in 2071, more people are asking about the details and about what other cities are in the running.

Denny Lien

We celebrate the life of the original post-supporting bid chair, Denny Lien, who passed away this last spring, shortly after Minicon 56. Denny was a core member of MN-STF and also a pre-supporter of Minneapolis in 2073. He made the effort to mail in his pre-support back in 2017, and we are happy to have him as a member, in memoriam.




