### **ELISE MATTHESEN**

Elise Matthesen is an American essayist, journalist, poet, and fiction writer (primarily of science fiction and fantasy; she is an active supporter of the interstitial arts movement), an award-winning maker of art jewelry and a long time Bisexual Rights activist. For 13 years she was the companion of the late John M. Ford, until his death in September 2006. She was born in Wisconsin, lives in Minneapolis and is a member of the First Universalist Church there.

**Career** She is an anorexia nervosa survivor as well as a speaker, facilitator, and activist on issues of body acceptance, bisexuality, polyamory, and issues of self-esteem. She was one of the original contributors to the groundbreaking 1991 bisexual anthology *Bi Any Other Name*, has written for local GLBT magazine *Lavender*, and is an active member of science fiction fandom.

In 1993 Jane Yolen published Matthesen's short story "The

Stone Girl" in the Xanadu anthology together with works by Tanith Lee and Ursula K. Le Guin. In 2008 Catherine Lundoff published Matthesen's short story "Focus of Desire" in an anthology of Lesbian ghost stories.

**Awards** In 2009, Matthesen was a World Fantasy Award nominee for the Special Award - Non-Professional "for setting out to inspire and for serving as inspiration for works of poetry, fantasy, and SF over the last decade through her jewelry-making and her 'artist's challenges'".

In 2020, she won the Hugo Award for Best Fan Artist, the first artist in a 3-D medium to do so.

### MINICON 55 CODE OF CONDUCT

Minn-stf acknowledges that interpersonal relationships in social settings are complex. Not everyone likes everyone else, and not everyone agrees with everyone else. Disagreements, friction, and vigorous debate are expected. However, interactions that become hostile or coercive do not have any part in a healthy social environment and Mnstf commits to addressing problem behaviors.

Harassment is difficult to define, and attempts at an exact definition are subject to rules-lawyering, so we won't attempt to do that. However, repeated unwelcome behaviors are mostly likely to be construed as harassment. If someone asks you not to touch them, not to talk to them, or not to refer to them in a way that they find objectionable, and you persist in doing so, you may be harassing them. Actions that are sufficiently egregious (assault, truly hateful language, and comparable actions) fall under this policy, even if only one occurrence has been noted. In the end, harassment is judged primarily by the person who feels harassed, and actions are more important than intent.

If you tell someone to stop something you see as harassing behavior and they don't, you may tell us. If you don't feel comfortable telling someone to stop harassing behaviour, you may also tell us. We want to make sure everyone is heard so that together we can make Minicon a healthy, fun, enjoyable experience for everyone.

### WHAT IS MNSTF?

It's the Minnesota Science Fiction Society. abbreviated MnStf, MinnSTF, MN-STF, and other variants. It's the non-profit group that brings you Minicon. Each year, the MNStF board of directors approves the next Minicon chairperson and looks after the continuing needs of the convention. Minstf does more than just Minicon. It also runs a small convention each year in the fall, mainly for the purpose of having something like Minicon, but without all that pesky programming and stress. Ours changes name frequently. Besides running conventions, Minnstf's major activity is hosting social events through the year (officially known as "meetings"). Those events include a summer picnic, a pool party, and social events, often at members' homes. Meeting locations are published in MnstF's monthly newsletter Einblatt, Twitter and Facebook, and the calendar on mnstf.org. The Einblatt is available at mnstf.org/einblatt. You can also sign up for our events and discussion mailing lists at mnstf.org. How do you become a member of MnStF? It's easy! If you ever attend a meeting, you're a member. If you sign in at five meetings in a year, you become a voting member for that year and can help choose the Minn-Stf board.

# WHERE DOES THE MONEY GO?

Minicon is a members-driven non-profit con. Our goal is to bring the community together, not to make the most money or to get the most people, although we take more people showing up as a good sign. We all chip in membership fees so that there's enough to run this thing and to support our parent organization, Mn-StF. If we have extra after that, it means we overcharged. We make an effort to hold the rates low and run a frugal con. We want you to know where your money goes, and we want to hear your opinion on our spending.

### **MINICON 54 FINANCES**

Minicon 54 was directed by the MN-Stf board to bring in \$2900 more than it spent, to cover the club's anticipated expenses of \$3900 (which includes storing Minicon's stuff), while spending down \$1000 of excess savings. We hit this almost exactly at \$3079. Memberships were 92% of our income, with donations, t-shirts, dealer tables and misc each making up 2%. The most common membership rate paid was \$45. If you paid \$45, here's where your money went:

For Minicon 55, the financial goal is \$3200.

Performers of all styles, genres, and experience levels are welcome and encouraged to participate, as are any and all interested listeners.

Scott Keever is a composer and performer who specializes in fingerstyle guitar. He works in a variety of genres, from jazz and classical to Balkan and Celtic, and a variety of guitars. In 2018, he released his "Solo Guitar: Vol. 1"; a follow-up album is in the works for 2022. He is currently a member of Orkestar Bez Ime (OBI), an award-winning ensemble that specializes in music from the Balkans and Eastern Europe. He has also been a member of Lojo Russo and Funks Grove, the Sweet Colleens, and Pirates of Dreamtime. He has also produced "El Dorado" the posthumous solo album for singer/songwriter Michael Methany (Gallowglass, Long Straight Forever) and also performed with Cats Laughing for Minicon 50.
